Summer Greetings

One of our later alumni have received an award for the best Nordic thesis in engineering management ('industriell ekonomi') by ScalEM.

Kajsa, what do you believe gave you that award?

I believe it was three different things. First, the topic of my thesis is timely and relevant for practitioners. Second, it introduced an interesting theoretical lens by combining the business model and translation literature. Third, it had an international perspective which is increasingly important in a globalized world.

What would be the elevator pitch of your thesis?

In my thesis, I studied a business model idea for solar energy developed in California that "travelled" to different European markets. My research increased our understanding of how a business model idea is inevitably adapted when brought to a new setting by focusing on the adaption process on a micro level. My translation perspective sheds light on how individuals shape the business model idea and change its meaning based on knowledge, experiences and interests.

Do you have any great memory since your time at the research school?

Many! My best memories involve meeting other Ph.D. students and scholars interested in similar research phenomena. To exchange ideas and thoughts always leads to new insights.

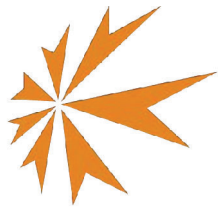

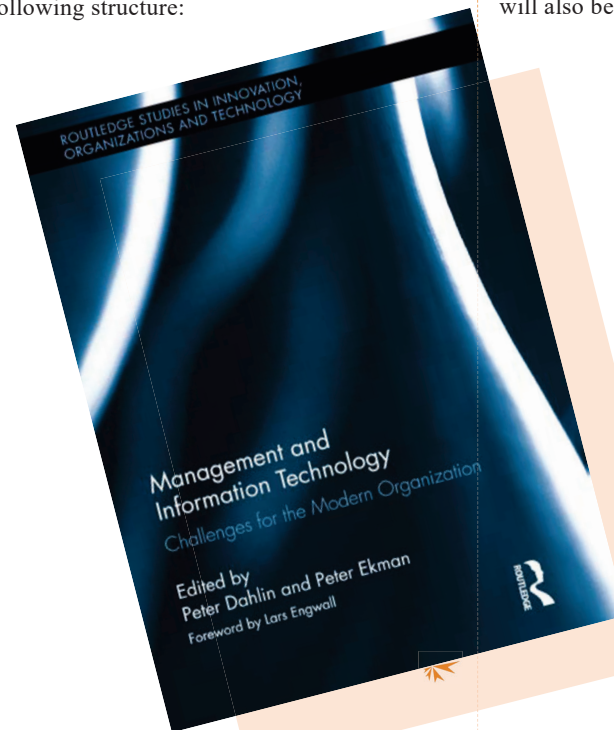
The first book *Management and Information Technology: Challenges for the Modern Organization* was edited and written by MIT alumni, focusing thought pieces that could spur reader interest. This time the aim is to develop a book that builds on a broader constellation of authors where the optimum is a combination of:

1. current MIT Ph.D. candidate(s),
2. MIT alumni or MIT senior (which can be the same), and
3. an international scholar or practitioner (i.e., outside the research school).

Any constellation of authors are accepted, but we would like to see some chapters with a team of authors that jointly covers 1-3.

The working title is *Management and Information technology in the Post-Digitalization Era*. We know that the title is provocative, given that the processes of digitalization are very much ongoing phenomena, but we would like to address the challenging task of managing all forms of information technology as well as all the data that is generated in organizations everyday practices. We plan to

Have 3-4 sections with 3-5 chapters in each section. We are open for any forms of chapters as well as suggestions on how to structure these sections. Thus, we would like your input on suitable chapters as well as relevant sections. Interested authors should send their chapter proposal to Peter Ekman (via email address peter.ekman@mdh.se) in the form of extended abstracts with the following structure:



- The title of your chapter
- Authors (incl. title and affiliation)
- Chapter description (300-500 words)
- 4-6 keywords
- (Voluntary) Section suggestions.

The due date for chapter proposition is **September 29, 2019**. The ambition is to inform whether there is material to a new book at MITFC2019 in Uppsala (notifications will also be sent by email). ■
