1 Identifying Civil Resistance Events during the Syrian Civil War

This dataset was coded for the timeframe 2014-2018, and contains information on events of collective, non-violent civil resistance against jihadist armed groups in Syria. The unit of observation is protest-day, measured at the city/village-level, which corresponds to the 4th, and most local, administrative level in Syria. In total, our dataset contains 624 observations of non-violent resistance. We identified these events by using a fixed string of search words, which were translated from English to Arabic for the Arabic language sources. A full overview of these search strings is provided below. The search strings were used for three main sources: first, both the English and Arabic-language website of the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights (SOHR);¹ second, the Revolutionary Forces of Syria (RFS) media office (both in English and Arabic);² and third, SMART News Agency, which was an Arabic-language news website run by one of Syria’s largest opposition networks.³

We only included events in the dataset that occurred in localities that were controlled by jihadist groups. However, determining the territorial control of Syrian towns and villages throughout the Syrian Civil War has been difficult, given the limitations in terms of data availability. Even the most well-respected sources that have mapped changes in territorial control during the Syrian Civil War have only published weekly updates and did not always (and consistently) differentiate between

which exact jihadist group was in control of a certain town or village, at a certain point in time. Thus, it was not possible to distinguish cases of resistance in HTS-held towns from events that occurred in, for instance, Ahrar al-Sham-controlled areas, not least since the many jihadist groups shifted their allegiances and formed alliances multiple times during the war. Still, we have only included an event if we could assume, based on the information provided in the original news articles, that it occurred in either rebel-controlled areas, or in areas that were contested between different armed actors, but not in government-controlled territories.

Search Strings

The search terms presented in the table below were used to identify the cases in our dataset. While the English-language terms were used for the English-language versions of the SOHR and the Revolutionary Forces of Syria (RFS) websites, SmartNews is a purely Arabic-language website. The Arabic-language search string was also used for the Arabic versions of the SOHR and RFS websites.

4 Further Comments

There are three observations in our dataset, where no demands could be identified at all. These three cases (Event_ID nr. 18, 19 and 401), were all coded with a ‘0’ for both maximalist and non-maximalist demands.
